at Roots and Shoots are times for gathering beneath the Walnut Tree, buying and selling, making and celebrating or quietly enjoying the Wildlife Garden.









Linda Phillips, Manager and Founder of Roots and Shoots and Philip Moore, Chair of Trustees write:

This year has been both difficult and memorable but has resulted in Roots and Shoots becoming more focussed and equipped to face the demands of the

years. This was due to changes in government criteria for funding programmer for disadvantaged young people. The revenue funding for our training was threatened and the future uncertain. Meanwhile, the building of the new Learning Centre was continuing apace. A lifeline was presented to us from the Central London Learning Skills Council with the opportunity to put in a bid to the European Social Fund. By Christmas 2004 we heard that our bid was successful with Central London Connexions Service as our partner. However, the conditions of the contract required that we revise our training delivery. The new ESF contract involves training 60 young people (16-19 years with a statement of special educational need) over a 2-year period. New trainees would have to achieve the City & Guilds NVQ at Level 1 in Horticulture or Distributive Trades (Retail) over a training period of 40 weeks as well as Skills for Life qualifications (English, Maths and Life Skills). A further blow was the loss of trainee allowances in April - these were reinstated after a meeting with a minister in the DfES. It was evident that the new training facilities in the Learning Centre would be essential if we were to deliver a structured framework of training that complies with the new requirements. This major upheaval, the limited funding and the reorganisation of resources has unfortunately led to the loss of three staff, two of whom had been with Roots and Shoots for many years.

Construction work on the new building was interrupted when Bensons, the contractor, went into liquidation. Fortunately, Bluestone took over all our contracts. There were no staff changes and only a certain amount of time lost.

With the support of council officers from Lambeth Regeneration we were then able to secure a further £250,000 from the LDA to complete 'phase 2' of the


building programme. This was the refurbishment of the Victorian coach house into 2 classrooms - computer room and meeting room. Meanwhile, the LSC extended our current contract through TBG Learning (who have been very supportive) to make us a subcontractor delivering 'Entry to Employment' training for the young people at Roots. The new ESF contract commenced in April 2005 with the existing 13 trainees being allowed to 'roll-over' into the new funding programme. This meant that they could complete their certification, undertake work experience placements and be given invaluable support and guidance for their future, be it in further education or employment. All were completed by the end of August.

By mid-summer, and the day after a most successful National Gardens Scheme Open Weekend, we were able to partially move in and have the portakabins removed. Roots and Shoots became spacious again and the future quality of our site became evident. The walnut tree has its own space!

Funding was also required this year for the Wildlife Garden manager's post. Due to the success of this project over the last six years it was felt that a full review was required to ensure the maximum development and use of our site for Environmental Education - including the sustainable features of the new building. We have been fortunate to secure funding for this programme and post from the Sheepdrove Trust and the Walcot Educational Foundation who share our vision for the future. We will begin work converting the old office/ classroom block into a Wildlife Garden Study Centre for our many visitors and partners. Autumn '05 finds us in a stronger position after the many stresses and changes of the past year. Our great thanks to Paul Notley, architect, and his team of professionals and to Doug Dalgleish, site manager for the builders. Special thanks also to the LDA, The Big Lottery, Bridge House Estates Trust, the Energy Saving Trust, Walcot Educational Foundation, Sheepdrove and the members of the local community and other trusts who have contributed to the funding of the new building and made it possible.

With support from Lambeth Education, Central London LSC, ESF and other Trusts, and especially from Kate Hoey MP, our Patron, we are now more stable again and can look forward to further progress and development.










The Wildlife Garden continues to attract some very striking insects and produce beautiful
